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Trustees' Week



The UK Trustees week runs from 6-10 November and is the perfect time to understand a trustee's role in the Northumberland Dog Rescue Charity, and to consider if you too would like to become a trustee yourself.

We already have a strong core of a trustee board, but are looking to strengthen and grow to reflect the rapidly increasing growth of the rescue centre and charity, in order to help even more dogs that are desperately in need of rescuing and rehoming in Northumberland.

Myths and Needs

What does a trustee do?

Trustees form the governing body, and are responsible for the management and administration of the charity.

Trustees work together as a team in decision making and have collective responsibility for the charity.

NDR trustees are volunteers and are actively involved in all aspects of the rescue charity, not just sat round a table making decisions!

But don't I have to be "old" or "retired" to be a trustee?

Far from it!

We want a young dynamic trustee board with fresh ideas and new approaches to help us continue to grow the charity and help even more rescue dogs throughout Northumberland.

People under the age of 30 normally have a different skill set when compared to a retiree for example, retail, technology, promotions, networking and communication being prime examples.

If you've got that love of dogs and a dynamic enthusiasm we can help you use your existing skills and develop new skills that will help you in all walks of life and employment.

What qualifications do I need to be a trustee?

None!

Just a love and passion for dogs.

What's in it for me?

Excellent opportunity to add teamwork, decision making and management of an organisation to your CV.
Satisfaction in knowing you're doing things to help the lives of the rescue dogs.

What commitment will I have to give to be a trustee?

As part of the induction process we expect you to volunteer for a shift at the kennels so you experience why the charity exists and what's involved for the staff at the kennels.

We expect trustees to attend a 2-3 hour meeting every 6-8 weeks in person, plus sufficient time to carry out the individual responsbilities, this can range from as little as a couple of hours a week up to as much time as you can spare.


